

7 important things to know about teaching Very Young Learners.





Learning Stars is a new 3-level course for Young Learners by Jeanne Perrett and Jill Leighton







Children need help to pay attention and to get used to classroom routines.



Children can, generally speaking, concentrate for about 2-5 minutes for each year old they are.

If they are	they can focus for
2	4-10 minutes
3	6-15 minutes
4	8-20 minutes
5	10-25 minutes
6	12-30 minutes
7	14-35 minutes
8	16-40 minutes
9	18-45 minutes
10	20-50 minutes



To get a child's attention, we must pay attention to them.

Check physical needs; food, water, air, temperature of room, clothing.

Vary activities and give lots of small breaks for exercise, water and fresh air.







Create an organised space for them to work and play in.








Create your own classroom routines.

Children need time and repetition.



Keep revising and recycling the language they have been introduced to in previous lessons.

Always start a lesson with something the children already know.

Start simple and gradually, very gradually build up their language.


Let them have plenty of time to absorb language before they produce it.



Teach the same words and phrases in lots of different ways.













Use puppets or toys









Puppets can...

repeat the same question again and again

make the same mistakes and experience the same difficulties as the children

show emotions which children might not want to admit to in class; shyness, reluctance and fear for example



Children can take in a lot of vocabulary and phrases.

What do we want to pack for our picnic?






How do we lay a cloth? Practise with a real one then mime the actions.













Vocabulary

- 1 Can recognise the words and point to pictures.
- 2 Can say the words when shown the pictures.
- 3 Pronounces the words correctly.
- 4 Can use the vocabulary in speaking.



Speaking

- 1 Greets teachers and classmates in English.
- 2 Uses structures learnt to express themselves in English in everyday situations.
- 3 Can form simple sentences with reasonable fluency.
- 4 Participates in guided speaking activities such as Act Out the story lessons and uses the target language appropriately.




Learning to read with Learning Stars We start with a careful phonics syllabus.



















Phonics

- 1 Can recognise and name both capital and lower case letters.
- 2 Can recognise and produce the letter sounds.
- 3 Can hear the initial sounds of the phonics words and identify the letters.
- 4 Can hear and identify the initial sounds of any given words and identify the letters.
- 5 Can form the letters correctly and neatly.



They need action, games and songs.




















Listening

- 1 Responds to English instructions.

They need to learn important life skills.










